Present-day Assam has a hybrid culture that is largely rooted to the simple agrarian way of life that these fertile plains have bestowed on the Assamese people.

We embark on our river journey with blessings from the 9th century Aswaklanta Temple perched on top of a hill on the north bank of Guwahati. With scenic views of the south bank, the main city skyline of Guwahati, it is an ideal introduction to the gateway of north-east India. After exploring this famous temple site and the north bank Assamese town on foot, we return to the cruise vessel.

# Your river journey on the Brahmaputra

India's Brahmaputra River is the 29th longest river in the world at 2,948 km long, and has a discharge of 19,200 cubic litres per second which puts northern India's great waterway in the top 10 when it comes to volume. This is a massive waterway, being the only river on Earth clearly visible from the moon during the Apollo missions. Flowing down from central Tibet through the legendary Tsangpo gorges, the Brahmaputra river opens out as it enters Assam to flow across that state and then through Bangladesh to flow out through the vast Sundarbans Delta, merging with the Ganges River as they discharge into the Bay of Bengal.

The Brahmaputra river may be little-navigated today in comparison to the colonial times - the pioneering river cruise company, 'Assam Bengal Navigation' established in 2003 is the only private family-run luxury operator besides government tie-ups. The river in places can be up to 20 miles wide and in the monsoon it floods the entire Assam plain. The river is so vast that any river cruise expedition undertaken here can be movingly wondrous, as you pass through this great emptiness of water, sand and shoal. Passengers of our Brahmaputra river cruises enjoy their river trips in peace and tranquility with very little human activity on the riverbank. That means the wild life and bird life are profuse.

# Lecture topic today - Introduction to Assam culture, history & nature

#### DAY 2

# 26th March 2021

#### Cruising upstream of the Brahmaputra River

The day is spent mostly cruising upstream with jungle-covered hills rising on either side, often battling against strong currents.

In Assam the Brahmaputra river is mighty, even in the dry season, and during the rains especially in the months of july and august its banks are more than 5 miles (8 km) apart. As the river follows its braided 450-mile (700-km) course through the valley in Assam, it receives several rapidly rushing Himalayan streams, including the Subansiri, Kameng, Bhareli, Dhansiri, Manas & more. With dozens of sediment-rich streams flowing south from the Himalayan highlands into the Brahmaputra Valley and an area with very high erosion rates near Namche Barwa, the Brahmaputra has one of the highest sediment loads per square kilometer of any river in the world. In some ways, the sediment is a blessing. Annual floods spread mineral-rich silt across farmland adjacent to the river, replenishing the soil. In other ways, it poses challenges as there is so much of it that large boats such as our vessels are limited to parts of the river that are navigable which is why we are constantly subject to river conditions that change yearly after the monsoons. Cruising with Assam Bengal Navigation means you are in the hands of the best river cruise operator, the pioneer with 18 + years of experience and expertise in operating long-distance river cruises in India on the Brahmaputra and the Ganges for discerning travellers from around the world.

# Indigenous tribal cuisine demonstration and lunch

Our chef onboard will introduce you to the indigeneous cuisine of Assam with a live cooking session. The first thing that strikes a first time foodie sampling the variety of cuisine in Assam is the delicacy of the flavours and the lightness of the food itself. There is a subtlety in the taste and aroma that makes sampling Assamese cuisine an experience of a different kind. Oils and fats in general are used sparingly, while a profusion of freshly plucked herbs enhance the flavour greatly. Vegetables and greens are used profusely, while rice, whether whole or powdered is a staple.

# Riverine village lifestyle of Assam

There is time to pause and visit a riverside village, with its lush green fields of vegetables and corn. Your accompanying guide and accompanying naturalist will brief you as you observe the simple riverine lifestyle of locals in Assam on foot.

#### Lecture topic - Myriad of indegenous tribes of Assam

Assam is the meeting ground of diverse cultures. The people of the enchanting state of Assam is an intermixture of various racial stocks such as Mongoloid, Indo-Burmese, Indo-Iranian and Aryan. The Assamese culture is a rich and exotic tapestry of all these races evolved through a long assimilative process. The natives of the state of Assam are known as "Asomiya" (Assamese), which is also the state language of Assam. The state has a large number of tribes, each unique in its tradition, culture, dress and exotic way of life. Diverse tribes like Bodo, Kachari, Karbi, Miri, Mishimi, Rabha, etc co-exist in Assam, most tribes have their own languages though Assamese is the principal language of the state.

# <u>Lecture topic - Assam tea plantation history and tea culture</u>

Nearly 200 years ago, a Scottish gentleman called Robert Bruce was wandering in the Upper Brahmaputra Valley, when he came across wild bushes that changed the world forever: Indian tea. Assam is surrounded by the foothills of the Himalayas in the north and south whilst the Brahmaputra

River flows from east to west. This topography forms one of the world's most abundant biodiversity zones. Assam's tea industry introduced socio-economic growth, including the arrival of planters from Britain and labourers from other parts of India, and a coming together of new customs, food and dastoors (culture). Today, the world's single largest tea-growing region, Assam's tea gardens collectively produce over 700 million kgs of tea each year! Assam teas are generally harvested from March until November.

# Assam Tea plantation visit & Assam tea tasting session

We will be visiting a beautiful Assam tea plantation today where a special tea-tasting experience will be hosted. The Assam Tea tasting class is a knowledge session that introduces you to the subtle flavours and varieties of Assam tea led by an expert tea taster and connoisseur by profession. The beauty of Assam tea lies in its hidden notes, delicate aromas, and bold flavours." And it is precisely such beauty that we seek to introduce to our guests over cups of exotic tea and fine blends.

#### Disembark

This morning, check out and drive for approx. 3 hours to Jorhat airport, or 4hours to Guwahati airport to catch your flight. Or, disembark and drive for 1 hour to Kaziranga National Park.

All cruising mentioned in these itineraries is subject to river and weather conditions.

All driving times mentioned in these itineraries are approximate.

For private transfers in an Innova Crista, the cost is at Rs 8000/- for an approx. 4hrs drive from Sil ghat to Guwahati Airport.

For private transfers to Kaziranga, the cost is at Rs. 4000/- for an approx. 1hr drive from Silghat to the western range of Kaziranga National Park where Diphlu River Lodge is situated. Please note that driving distances between western range to eastern range of the park is around 2hrs between them.

For private transfer with an Innova Crista for airport pick up at arrival from Guwahati airport to Pandu Ghat, the cost is at Rs.3000/-
